SYMPHONY LEAGUE ADVOCACY FALL 2023

NATIONAL

October was National Arts and Humanities Month. Below is an excerpt from the Proclamation issued by President Biden recognizing the importance of the Arts.



President Biden stated, "During the throes of the American Revolution, General George Washington wrote a letter to the American Academy of Arts and Sciences saying, 'The arts and sciences [are] essential to the prosperity of the State and... the ornament and happiness of human life.' His words are a reminder that, since our founding days, America's arts and humanities have helped tell the story of our Nation. They represent the freedom of expression that empowers Americans to speak and think independently and creatively. They build bridges of understanding by chronicling the shared experiences of hope, heartbreak, joy, and pain that help us see ourselves in one another. And they record and wrestle with the truth of our history while envisioning all the possibilities our future holds. During National Arts and Humanities Month, we celebrate all the artists and scholars whose works depict the rich, enduring soul of our Nation." Victory for the Arts in the U.S. House of Representatives! There were two attempts to eliminate federal funding for the arts and humanities in the FY'24 Appropriations bill and both were soundly defeated! The Freedom Caucus Chairman sponsored two floor amendments to eliminate all funding for the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) and the National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH). 100% of Democrats and 39% of Republicans voted against both amendments to make it a BIPARTISAN declaration that Congress supports the arts and culture. You can now see your House member voted on the NEA vote and the NEH vote. Next step is that this House bill will now move to

the Senate. We will be lobbying for \$207 million.

Arts Advocates. This victory is due, in no small part, to the hard work of arts advocates, and demonstrates the influence arts advocates have when united together to support important arts programs. Many of you responded to our Symphony League's email and signed a letter in support. Remember when you get these email requests from us it is very easy, just click the button in the email to sign...that's it! The rest is done for you electronically, and your signed letter is then produced and sent!

CALIFORNIA

Proposition 28. In California it is a truly historic moment for arts education! Proposition 28, the Arts & Music in Schools Act passed by California voters in November 2022, provides PreK-12 schools with ongoing funding to increase arts instruction. The unprecedented investment, approximately \$800 million – \$1 billion annually, is intended to increase equity and access to arts education. Parents, grandparents, students, teachers, arts organizations, and community members – You have a key role to engage with school leaders to ensure funds are used to expand current arts education programming, so please connect with school leaders to raise awareness about the opportunities of Proposition 28.

Governor Gavin Newsom signs groundbreaking law promoting affordable housing for artists working in cultural districts, helping set protections for the state's cultural treasures and greater economic opportunity for artists.

Governor Gavin Newsom signed Assembly Bill 812 which allows local governments to reserve affordable housing in cultural districts for artists at risk of being displaced by rising housing costs. The first of its kind in the state, AB 812 provides a tool for local governments whose jurisdictions include a cultural district and who recognize the need to retain the artists and cultural workers who make these neighborhoods unique.

Artists are the lifeblood of our cultural communities and help preserve the cultural footprint of the region. This prevents artists from having to move away from the neighborhoods they contribute so much to, simply because they can no longer afford to live there.

This is a groundbreaking win for California's arts and culture sector. The creative economy generates over 7.25% of the state's economy. A 2021 survey by the city of Berkeley found that while most working artists and cultural workers are highly educated, 60% have low, very low, or extremely low income, and many are experiencing displacement pressures due to increasing housing prices in cultural communities. While California recognized its artists as "essential" and declared them the state's "second responders" in 2019, this new law helps educate state and local decision makers that many artists are part of the vulnerable class of low-earning California workers that should be considered when producing workforce housing.

Sustained Advocacy WORKS! Governor Newsom signed a budget which included funding for <u>SB1116</u>, <u>the Equitable Payroll Fund</u>. After two years of sustained advocacy and engagement with elected officials, the state is directing \$11.5 million of unexpended funds from the CA Venues and Nonprofit Performing Arts grant programs to finally launch the program. Advocacy efforts were all critical. This was an uphill battle and a tremendous win.

The National Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 (AEP6)

Study was conducted by Americans for the Arts. The study was conducted in partnership with the majority of States and their local regions. The results are just now in the process of being released to each region. The Study showed Santa Clara County's nonprofit arts and culture industry generated \$384.5 million in economic activity in 2022, including \$292 million in San Jose. Countywide, the arts supported 5,916 jobs, provided \$243.2 million in personal income to residents and generated \$63.9 million in government tax revenue.

Thus we see demonstrable evidence that the arts help with residents' well-being and communities prosperity and can impact generations to come. Art not only fills our souls but strengthens our economy. Art is serious business.
